### Patients' Views on Data Sharing

NEJM Paper: Mello, Van Lieou, Goodman, 2018

<8% of clinical trial patients felt the potential negative consequences of data sharing outweighed the benefits.

93% were very or somewhat likely to allow their own data to be shared with university scientists

\*\*\* Concerns center on use in litigation, use for profit, worries about discouraging study participation

# **Early Planning Activities for Researchers**

- Repositories (including scientists and research staff) offer expertise and guidance in data management
- Planning for costs
- Selecting a "trusted" repository that can fully support dissemination and preservation.
  - Understand any repository requirements
- Creating research protocols with data sharing in mind (informed consent)

# Data Sharing in Informed Consent

- Ethical requirement in research that is <u>relevant</u> at all stages of the research lifecycle from planning to collection to publication to data sharing.
- Understand <u>how</u> there data will be used, <u>by</u> whom, and any associated <u>risks</u> to privacy
  - How confidentiality will be maintained when data are shared

## Informed Consent Language

- Avoid limiting statements prohibiting data from being shared
- Inform participants that their information may be used <u>beyond the purposes that they were</u> <u>originally collected</u> for
- Whether <u>direct identifiers</u> will be kept, how they will be kept, and if they will be part of information that shared with others

## **Data Depositor Agreement**

Formal institutional <u>agreement</u> between the organization(s) collecting data and the Repository

<u>Communicate</u> institutional responsibilities, obligations, and conditions for access, management and so on

This agreement should <u>match</u> the commitments made through the language of the informed consent

# Management of Disclosure Risk at the Repository

- Repository practice is to <u>review all data for</u> <u>disclosure risk</u>
- Assess both risk of <u>reidentification</u> (both direct and inferential) and risk of <u>harm</u> (and mitigation)
  - Review and remove <u>direct identifiers</u> (usually)
  - Combinations of other attributes can become identifiers

# Managing Access to Confidential Data

<u>Secure Download</u> - ICPSR manages data access by authorized users (RDUA & Data Security Plan) (output is self-vetted)


<u>Virtual Data Enclave</u> - ICPSR manages data access by authorized through a secure, Windows environment & all microdata remain securely at ICPSR (staff authorize output)

<u>Physical Data Enclave</u> - onsite, montored (staff authorize output)

# **Examples of Data Ethically Shared via ICPSR**

- Large-scale, national survey data
- Qualitative data, including video data
- Clinical, experimental, interventions
- Administrative records data (e.g.)
- Brain images, sensor data, and more...
- Sensitive Information: IPV, Criminal Behavior, HIV status, Drug Use



#### Summary 3

The purpose of this data collection is to provide an appropriate theoretical and empirical approach to concepts, measures, and methods in the study of Black Americans. The questionnaire was developed over two years, with input from social scientists, students, and a national advisory panel of Black scholars. The final instrument encompasses several broad areas related to Black American life. The study explores neighborhood-community integration, services, crime and community contact, the role of religion and the church, physical and mental health, and self-esteem. It also examines employment, the effects of chronic unemployment, the effects of race on the job, and interaction with family and friends. In addition, the survey provides information on racial attitudes, race identity, group stereotypes, and race ideology. Demographic variables include education, income, occupation, and political behavior and affiliation.
